




St. Joseph Sacred Heart Room

Pastor's Notes "The Baptism of the Lord"

There are a number of perennial articles of our faith that are constantly confused. One such example is the Immaculate Conception. Many people wrongly think that this mystery of our faith deals with Jesus being conceived in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary by the power of the Holy Spirit. This is wrong. It is the teaching that Mary was conceived, through the normal process, in the womb of her mother St. Ann and that by a singular act of God, Who foresaw the Salvation that His Son would win for all mankind, prevented any stain of sin from touching her so that she could be a worthy vessel to carry His Son.

A similar confusion comes about with the feast we celebrate today, The Baptism of the Lord. To put it in the simplest of terms, <u>Jesus Christ never received the Sacrament of Baptism!!</u> Sacraments do not come into existence until after the Church is founded on Pentecost. So if Jesus does not receive the Sacrament of Baptism, what is His Baptism all about?

It is actually one of the Epiphanies (plural!) of Jesus. Usually we think of the feast of the Epiphany as what we celebrated last week when the Magi visit the infant Jesus. In fact, since the most ancient of times, Christians have celebrated the Epiphanies of especially the Nativity, the visit of the Magi, the Baptism of the Lord, and the miracle at Cana. I personally think the Transfiguration could be included in this list as well. So today we celebrate the Epiphany of Jesus' Baptism by John in the Jordan.

The prophecy from Isaiah in our first reading tells us what to expect:

"Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit; he shall bring forth justice to the nations, not crying out, not shouting, not making his voice heard in the street. A bruised reed he shall not break, and a smoldering wick he shall not quench, until he establishes justice on the earth; the coastlands will wait for his teaching."

In other words, "There's a new Sheriff in town and things are gonna be different!" How so? Remember last week how we saw the brutal and tyrannical way that Herod ran his kingdom. He died a tragic figure, hated by most everyone. While we might not want to end up like Herod, most everyone would admire his power, wealth, and prestige. Jesus comes along and, by submitting Himself to John's Baptism the Sinless One counts Himself among the sinners. He does not make noise for Himself in the street and is so gentle that He will not break off a stick that is already bent or put the final snuff to a smoldering candle.

What has been the result? Since Jesus, the likes of Caesar, Napoleon, Hitler, Stalin, the Khmer Rouge, Mao Zedong, and their ilk have ruled with violence and brutality. They may have been effective in the short term but died despised. Jesus and the proclamation of the Gospel have lived on. With which should we cast our lot?

WHAT A GREAT CHRISTMAS THIS YEAR!!

It was great to see such eager participation in our Christmas Masses. The 5:00 pm Christmas Eve Mass was packed, as usual. And what was particularly edifying was the attendance at our Midnight Mass. While the church was not packed, it was full. And even more inspiring were the number of families with children who came—and most all of the kids stayed awake! The two Christmas day Masses were a little thin, but no more so than would be expected given such great attendance at both the Christmas Eve Masses.

I would also like to offer my thanks on behalf of the office staff and Fr. Tony for all the goodies people dropped off at the parish office. We also had some generous end-of-the-year donations to the parish which, of course, are greatly appreciated. I have sent out many thank-you's for the many generous and kind cards and gifts parishioners have sent me. I hope I responded to them all. If somehow I failed to acknowledge a gift, please accept my thanks and apologies.

Many thanks to our parish choir that put in so many hours to add that special touch to midnight Mass and those who planned the Christmas pageant as well as those actors, narrator and musicians. Thanks to all the sacristans, servers, readers, ushers and especially those who participated in our beautiful Advent Vesper Services, either leading or in the pew. Least I forget all the people who helped decorate the church itself for Christmas! Beautiful.

I noted once in the past that tradition is not a matter of guarding a pile of ashes, it is the act of feeding the fire which our parish has done admirably this Christmas. We should all be encouraged and joyful as we strive to keep our Christmas traditions alive and thriving.



QUESTION: Why do we baptize infants when the Bible says "repent and be baptized"? How can an infant repent?

ANSWER: When you take a trip, you do not wait until you run out of gas before you fill the tank-at least not on purpose! You fill your tank and pack your bags as you anticipate a trouble-free journey. We can make a similar case for the baptism of children as they begin their spiritual journey. In the early church, only adults were baptized when they professed faith in Jesus as the Messiah. As the church grew, children were baptized and raised in faith. Baptism was the first sacrament of initiation, followed by confirmation and holy Communion.

The Bible does not limit baptism to adults. Several passages point to infant baptism. Jesus said "Let the children come to me and do not hinder them," while Paul would baptize people "and their household." He did not limit baptism to adults. None of the early Church Fathers wrote that the practice was wrong or that a formal act of repentance was a necessary step. If anything, our whole life is an act of repentance, a continual struggle to turn from sin and be faithful to the Gospel. We believe that baptism is more than a symbolic act of faith. It forgives original sin as well as personal sin, and brings us into the church, where we begin our journey of faith. © 2011 Liturgical Publications Inc

You might say you don't remember it because you were an infant. Perhaps you do not even know the date it took place. You might not feel like it has had much impact on you at all. However, it has made all the difference.



WHO IS IN THAT WINDOW AT ST. JOSEPHS

Over the past few months we had a number people ask to have the articles written by Fr. Gilmary on the windows in the church. These articles were written in 2007 while the windows were all going through a restoration.


Today we look at the left pane of the window.

Philomena was unknown until the 1800's. In 1802 a tomb was discovered in the Catacombs of St. Cecilia in Rome with the bones of a girl about 13 tears old. Everything about the tomb indicated it belonged to a martyr. There was confusing writing on the tomb which almost certainly was a code. When the letters were rearranged, the words in Latin said, "Peace be with you, Philomena". An anchor and arrows were drawn inside the tomb. An anchor indicated hope, and the arrows told how Philomena was out to death.

All these symbols are present in our window, which was designed and crafted in the 1800's. Throughout that century St. Philomena was extremely popular. Philomena's feast is no longer in the universal Church calendar because nothing is known about her.

But, many people still pray to this young saint who has the title "Powerful of God".

Next week we will look at a couple of mystery saints.




